Ah, you don't find one of these everyday. Here is truly a rare and unique computer for the collector. It was marketed in 1987 by Canon and sold for \$1495. It is in excellent working condition, as is the printer. Is this what Jef Raskin had in mind for the original Macintosh? He originated the Macintosh project at Apple in 1979 and then went on to form Information Appliance, Inc. The creation of the Cat began there. Here is a partial quote by Raskin from an interview in 1996 -

"However, the Canon Cat as marketed by Canon was only a dim echo of what my colleagues and I (at Information Appliance Inc.) worked on. For example, most people only know it as a closed-architecture (which it wasn't) secretarial workstation.

This is because Canon did not want to reveal that it was actually a 68000-based bitmapped product with a nice set of graphics tools in ROM--which tools they never used. This was partly because they decided to bundle it with a daisywheel printer (!) that could not do graphics and partly because it was brought out by their electric typewriter division and not their computer division. Most observers at the time thought the marketing had been botched, and I am not going to disagree. Designed to allow easy integration of third-party software, Canon never pursued this essential path, and the few third-party vendors we had begun to sign up never had time to complete their work before Canon bailed out. The Cat had a connector and software hooks for a pointing device, but Canon never provided a mouse or mouse-equivalent for it.

In many ways it was, for 1987, far ahead. 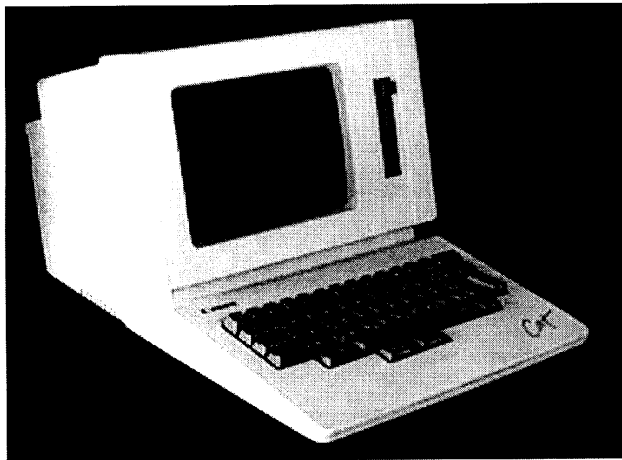

Wow, what a find! This little card goes into a slot in your Apple ][e and transforms it into a Canon Cat like interface with "leap" keys. Includes the card, software diskette, manual and even the original shipping box from Information Appliances with a postal sticker originating from Palo Alto and dated 11/8/85. Here's some background -

"The company that Jef Raskin founded in 1984 to implement his computing ideas was located in Menlo Park California and was named Information Appliance, Inc.

Information Appliances goal was to create a computer system that would be both powerful and easy to use. The company developed a prototype Cat system code named "SWYFT". Doug McKenna, a former company director and now the key person behind the Macintosh development tool Resorcerer, said that he proposed that "SWYFT" be read as "Superb With Your Favorite Typing." Funding for this company came from around a dozen venture capitalists.

Raskin's business plan was to create and market the Cat using only Information Appliance. But the company's backers thought Information Appliances could not do this as well as a bigger and already established company. As such, the venture capitalists talked with several computer companies that had an interest in the Cat and selected Canon to market the Cat. Canon was responsible for giving the "SWYFT" the product name "Cat."

While the Information Appliance engineers developed the Cat the company's venture capitalists thought it would be beneficial for the company to release some of the Cat's technology as a small board based product. The result of the was an add-on plug-in board for the Apple ][e computer. This card was called the SwyftCard, a name which obviously was based upon the Cat's code name. The SwyftCard retail price was \$90.
